### NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE **BRIDGES NO. 59 and NO. 69 REPLACEMENT PROJECT**

Sixth Line Nassagaweya between No. 5 SR and No. 15 SR

The Town of Milton will be replacing two bridges located on the Sixth Line Nassagaweya between No. 5 SR and No. 15 SR.

Bridge #59 is located on the Sixth Line approximately 4.2 km. north of No. 5 SR on the Sixth Line Nassagaweya. The bridge was constructed in 1940 over the same creek that flows into Hilton Falls. It is a concrete structure having a single span of approximately 6.2 metres (20 ft.) and a deck width of 6.1 metres (20 ft.)

Bridge #69 is located approximately 3.6 km. north of No. 5 SR also on the Sixth Line Nassagaweya. The bridge was constructed in 1945 just south of #59 and crosses the same creek. Very similar in construction as #59, it has a single span of approximately 6.6 metres (21'6"), a deck width of only 6.8 metres (22 ft.), no safety railings or vehicle approach protection.

A Public Information Centre is being held to provide the public with an opportunity to review project drawings and to discuss any potential construction disruptions from the proposed works. Staff from the Town of Milton and the engineering consultant will be in attendance to answer questions.

#### NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE TWISS ROAD CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT STUDY

Study Area: Approximately 1.5 Kilometres north of Derry Road (Twiss Hill) to Steeles Avenue

Twiss Road between Derry Road and Steeles Avenue is a 2 lane rural road. The road is currently paved from Derry Road north for approximately 1.5 kilometers with the remainder being gravel.

In preparation of road reconstruction that will address existing road deficiencies including vertical and horizontal alignments, the Town of Milton has implemented a study, in accordance with the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) process. 

# Rural thefts shock residents

ome homeowners in Halton Hills (whose names cannot be disclosed) narrowly missed being robbed while they were asleep, making this the latest incident in a series of local house break-ins.

On the night of November 4, a house on Eighth Line, south of 5 Sideroad in Halton Hills, was the target of a robbery. But Detective Carol Crowe from the Halton Regional Police Service said things didn't go as planned.

"The homeowners woke up last night (November 4) and scared them off. They flee if somebody wakes up."

Detective Crowe said she couldn't disclose any more information on this specific break-in since the investigation is ongoing. Four to five detectives have been assigned to this case and other similar break-ins, all of which took place in rural areas of Halton Hills.

But she did say that Halton police believe this break-in as well as six others that occurred between midnight on October 25 and 6am on October 26 are related. The break-ins last month took place at residences in the Steeles Avenue and Sixth Line area of Halton Hills. Police are also considering the possibility that these nighttime breakins are linked to another six ocurrences around the same area, but during the day.

"We believe this to be a single group of individuals that have targeted this area," she said.

According to a news release issued in late October by the Halton Regional Police, last month's break-ins involved entries into houses while the residents were there. The suspects gained

entry through unlocked windows or doors. The suspects would then steal items such as purses, wallets, keys, and in one case the car out of the garage after picking up the keys inside the house.

Detective Crowe said it's fortu-, nate that no one has been injured as a result of these break-ins. "There haven't been any (physical) confrontations."

Betty Brownridge, a resident of Sixth Line, was affected by the break-ins and she's glad that she wasn't injured or worse. Mrs. Brownridge's house was broken into sometime in the evening or early morning on October 25 or 26. "I was down the hall three times that night. At 3 a.m. I had a cookie and orange juice."

The fact that Mrs. Brownridge and her husband, Ward, had been robbed didn't register until Mr. Brownridge looked into his garage in the morning. There was no sign of the couple's 1999 beige Ford Taurus valued at about \$10,000. They also discovered that \$150 had been taken - along with the car keys - from Mrs. Brownridge's purse. The vehicle was found a few days later off Heritage Road.

Detective Crowe advises people to light up their property as much as possible at night to make it less attractive for break-ins. It's also helpful to consider leaving a TV or radio on to make it look like somebody is awake. Keep everything locked, including garage doors and vehicles.
