- · The City of Guelph, in exchange for Halton water, buys The Township of Puslinch and allows Dufferin Aggregates gravel rights if they leave all the Niagara


Escarpment alone.



Your reporting of the United Way Christmas House Tour is not only appreciated by the Tour organizers but by the community itself as


