## Gary Carr house hunting in Milton

## The practicalities of life after the election

lthough he was the Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP) for Oakville for thirteen years, it was one very bold move in 2003 on Gary Carr's part that brought him to the attention of Prime Minister Paul Martin. A Progressive Conservative party member, Carr was serving as the Speaker of the House when he cited then Premier Ernie Eves for contempt following the release of the province's budget outside of the House, in the Magna plant. That was when his phone began to ring. "Paul called me at that time to comment on what I'd done," explains Carr. "I had always been a big fan of his when he was the Finance Minister, so it was really great to hear from him." That moment sparked a dialogue between the two politicians that eventually saw the Prime Minister asking Carr to represent the Liberal Party in Halton in June's election. Carr switched his allegiance to the Liberals and won the election by almost fifty percent of the vote.

"I'm just pleased to be the Member of Parliament for Halton and working on behalf of the people of the riding," says Carr, who isn't intimidated by the prospect of making the switch from MPP to MP. "The two jobs are really very similar in some ways and different in others," he points out. "Some of the issues remain the same in both levels of government. What I'm really looking forward to is the opportunity to meet people and discuss issues." The Prime Minister's Cabinet has been announced, and he is very supportive of the choices made by the Prime Minister, even though he wasn't named as a Cabinet Minister himself.

"The Prime Minister had a lot of veteran MP's to chose from, with a great deal of experience," Carr explains matter of factly. "Not having a place in the Cabinet will allow me to spend more time with my

constituents, learning their issues and attending special events." He was thrilled to be included in Milton's Canada Day celebrations the week after the election, and looks forward to many more such events.

Equally thrilling for him was the invitation, after the caucus meeting, to the Prime Minister's cottage at Harrington Lake. "It was a really wonderful chance to meet everyone in an informal setting and it was great

because he had also invited all of the members who had either lost their seats or retired," says Carr. "It was a chance to say hello to the new faces and good bye to the old." That sort of gesture though, is something that he says is typical of his new boss, Paul Martin. "He's been very nice, very warm and down to earth," pronounces Carr. "Everyone calls him Paul, he has a very relaxed style."

For now, Carr is scrambling to set up not only new offices in Halton and Ottawa, but new residences as well. He has taken over the office used by his predecessor Julian Reed at 14 Martin Street in Milton and is currently searching for a new home in the area for himself, wife Teresa and daughters Lindsay and Mackenzie. His son Gavin will visit the new home when he can as he attends the University of British Columbia. "That's my task for August, to find a place to live," laughs Carr who jokes that it was Milton Mayor Gord Krantz who convinced him to focus his search around Milton. "My work as an MP means that I already know all of the area mayors and most of


