cademy Award nominated filmmaker M. Night Shyamalan's has brought yet another film to the box office that is meant to scare the off audience. any pants Unfortunately, The Village fails to instill the same sense of fear that Shyamalan's The Sixth Sense did back in 2002. With a cast of actors and actresses like Joaquin Phoenix, Bryce Dallas Howard, Adrien Brody, William Hurt, Sigourney Weaver, and Brendan Gleeson, I was disappointed when the film didn't live up to my expectations of a nightmare inducing story.

Set in a village in 1897, the film is based on a community that is sequestered by their fear of the dreaded Covington Woods. Taught from a young age, all members of the village follow the same code of conduct that clearly asserts they shall not go past the boundary of the woods for fear of what lies inside. The tag line in the film is repeated several times in order to instill suspense in the audience, however, the repetition in the film also functions as a means of brainwashing the members of the town. "Those whom we do not speak of" often brings a hush to a large crowd in the film and causes characters to latch onto one another for dear life.

Throughout the film Shyamalan weaves in a love story that is not typical of his works. Though the premise of the storyline still rests on the dreaded creatures in the woods, there is not initially enough physical proof to indicate their nature or presence and the love story takes precedence. The movie operates in much the same concept as Alfred Hitchcock's 1960 thriller Psycho. By not physically showing the violence, Shyamalan, like Hitchcock, operates on the imagination of the audience, which can sometimes surpass capabilities onscreen. Although the film is littered with violinist accompaniment that works mechanically to generate an expectation in the audience, Shyamalan doesn't give into the audience need for visual confirmation of the creatures until well into the second hour.

Since the typical Shyamalan secret ending is not revealed until the last 20 minutes, the film felt more like an extended episode of Little House On the Prairie than a mystery or thriller. Not recommended for young audiences may warn viewers about the content of the scary creatures but what is revealed about human nature is even more frightening.
