

"Halton region welcomes Peter Crockett"

Region of Halton, as retiring Commissioner of Planning and Public Works Patrick Murphy is replaced by newcomer Peter Crockett. The new Commissioner of Planning and Public Works comes to Halton from the City of Hamilton, where he held the position of General Manager, Public Works.

"The first week has been very interesting," says the forty-seven year old engineer. "I've met a lot of really interesting people." The opportunity to work with new faces was in actuality, one of the factors that brought Crockett to the Region. "Halton has a great reputation of quality staff and quality people, as well as a respectful staff and Council relationship," explains Crockett. "It was the relationship between staff

and Council that was so attractive. That and all of the exciting things happening in Halton right now. There's so much going on now from a planning standpoint."

"Mr. Crockett brings a range of experience, including public works operations and transportation planning, to the Region," stated Marshall. "This combination of skills and experience will ensure Peter is a valuable addition to Halton's Management team, as well as an effective leader within the Planning and Public Works Department."
