Raising the Bar for Halton education

I ducation in Ontario has come a long way since the mid nineties when funding for educational programs decreased by more then \$20 million dollars in the Halton area. This dramatic change over the years has resulted in fewer resources, fewer programs, and impacts on many educational activities like music, drama and the arts. The Halton Learning Foundation was formed in 1997 when board administration members and trusties decided to take action with pending budget cuts on many educational programs. Since then, many valued programs like Physical Education, the Arts and Enrichment courses have benefited from the fundraising efforts of the Halton Learning Foundation.

A widely accepted report on education funding in Canada is The Promise of a Future report, conceived in 2002 by the Equality Task Force and led by Dr. Mordechai Rozanski. It states that since 1992 the dollar expenditure

on education in Ontario has declined almost \$20 million dollars. With schools and communities growing these numbers staggeringly increase with the higher demands of rapidly growing technology and interests in the work force. Local school boards today receive a directed stream of funds for specific areas and programs; targeting the basics first and then fueling other programs with whatever funds are left. This doesn't leave much for Art and Music since this funding formula doesn't recognize the higher cost and value of these programs.

The goal of the Halton Learning Foundation is that 100% of every dollar strapped programs.

On September 2nd the second annual Driving for Excellence golf tournament will take place at Crosswinds Club House and Golf Course.
