### The sound of church music Paraguayan Harp music in Norval

orval Presbyterian Church will be hosting a special performance on September 17 featuring the music of Eduard Klassen, a Canadian musician who plays the Paraguayan harp.

Music, however, won't be the only entertainment offered during the evening. Elly van Rijs, a member of the church's intercommunity outreach team, says Mr. Klassen is known for his humourous commentary. Between performances of Christian harp music

from South America, North America and Europe, there will be personal stories in the form of testimonials.

Mr. Klassen, who was born and raised in Paraguay, began playing this Paraguayan harp, unlike its musical

relative the classical harp, is a traditional folk instrument. The harp was developed in the 17th and 18th centuries when Spanish missionaries arrived in South America. The missionaries brought with them classical harps, instruments that intrigued the natives so much that they ended up developing their own version of the instrument.
