All the World's a Stage Oakville's Yo Mustafa

Yo Mustafa may not be a large man, but what he lacks in stature he more than makes up for in heart. Yo is the sort of man that when he hugs you at the end of your first meeting with him, it somehow feels both comfortable and appropriate.

The Artistic Director for West End Studio Theatre (W.E.S.T.), Yo is guided by two strong professional goals: to promote and provide quality live productions that are accessible to all, and to work with and encourage children dreaming of a career in the theatre. W.E.S.T. provides year round training to students of all ages in a variety of classes ranging from Creative Drama for three and a half to five year olds to three levels of Film and TV Acting for ages 9 to 17, and all the way up to Broadway at West for adults. There's even a Creative Drama and Social Skills for Special People class aimed at 10 to 14 year olds who are differently abled.

THE STUDIO SHOULD BE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT FOR EVERYBODY

"I just feel that the studio should be a safe environment for everybody, and accessible to everybody from age 3 1/2 to 300," explains Yo, who also pointed out that "part of having a theatre company though, should be a responsibility to the community." He was recently nominated by Athena Oakville for Outstanding Contribution to Bettering Women's Lives and he has also been active in fundraising efforts for Dogs Service National the Organization, leading to the purchase of two service dogs for autistic children in Halton.

He is Yo to his students and the teachers of his classes, but he was born Yilmaz Mustafa on the Mediterranean island of Cyprus. Emigrating with his family to Canada in 1971, at the age of ten, came with it's own share of difficulties for the young man learning to speak English. It was a teacher in his new home land that introduced the young Yo to mime and theatre as a way of bridging the language gap. "I love teaching, because of the teachers I had, who didn't let language be a barrier," says Yo. In fact, not only has Yo spent much of his 24 year professional career in the theatre as a formal teacher, he can also often be found guest speaking at public schools to those kids interested in a career in the theatre.

"It's more than a recreation, there's a lot of education and knowledge involved," explains Yo. "We really want

Along with teaching, making the arts more accessible is high on Yo's agenda. "You can see really well done, quality theatre outside of Toronto," he insists. He has directed plays in Oakville and Milton for many years with a great deal of success. His direction of "Come Back to the Five and Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean" for the Milton Players won him the ATCO directing award, and his direction of "Steel Magnolias" for the same group had to extend its run to accommodate all who wanted to see it.

"The mandate has always been to educate people about theatre and to make it accessible to people outside of Toronto," sums up Yo, who is quick to point out that the success of W.E.S.T. is largely in part to his talented and professional crew of teachers. W.E.S.T. has three productions planned for the upcoming months including "Brighton Beach Memoirs" September 9 to 11, 15 to 18, "A Christmas Pantomime" on December 17,18, and 19, and "Grease" from Feb. 10 to 12, and Feb. 16 to 19. All performances will take place at the Oakville Centre for the Performing Arts.

Without a Paddle

If you're looking for a hilarious way to end the summer holidays, I highly recommend going to see Without a Paddle. Directed by Little Nicky's Steven Brill, this boisterous comedy is a full two-hour spoof on Deliverance, complete with an extended cameo by Burt Reynolds. The story follows three seemingly grown up friends who pact together one last time to celebrate the life of their dearly departed playmate from childhood. As soon as the three thirtysomethings decide to take a canoe trip through backcountry Oregon, the entire movie takes a turn for the funny.

Slapstick comedy and general outdoorsy antics prevail as Seth Green, Matthew Lillard and Dax Shepard claw their way through the wilderness. In search of D.B. Cooper's long lost treasure, these the three inexperienced men get more than they bargained for with rapids, rain and the wrath of two rednecks throughout their journey. Of course there is the typical comedic chase scenes and a little romance with the tree huggers they find living in an ancient redwood, but the film relies mostly on the mischief between the three friends.

While the film uses mainly ideas from Deliverance, there are also several other elements that are adapted from popular films. Some elements were clearly borrowed ideas like the speeding bike chase scene that could have been pulled straight from Return of the Jedi while other references like one of the cliff jumping scenes closely imitated Butch Cassidy and The Sundance Kid without being obvious. The best reproduction scene, however, is when the rednecks are chasing the three men with guns and Seth Green dodges the bullet like Neo in The Matrix. Although this is one of the most famously imitated scenes, Green makes it hilarious by actually making the verbal reference to the film in his intoxicated state.

The film runs about an hour and a half but the continuous laughter makes it feel much shorter. The film is rated PG-13 because of drug content, sexual material, language, crude humor and some violence, so be sure and limit those younger viewers until they're old enough to understand that in reality, being (up the creek) Without A Paddle may not be that much fun!
