# Cartoons are new art form

### Local artist finds his voice on the Internet



he hardest working cartoonist on the internet goes by the penname "Inkz" or \_ to those who really know the man behind the character, Greg Aikenhead. Every night when he comes home at 12:30am he walks downstairs to his basement studio to put another panel together for his newest cartoon masterpiece "Echo Therapy:" Loosely based on his own life and experiences as a cartoonist caught in dreams and conflicts, and striving to find his voice as an artist.

Greg started his passion for cartooning when attending high school, submitting his work for a local underground 'Zine" called Agent Orange. He enrolled and attended Sheridan's Illustration course from September 1999 to April 2001.

The website, (http://macstudios.keenspace.com) first constructed in 1998 was a comic dealing with the slacker culture of video games and geek lifestyle. "I was previously very anti computer before going into Sheridan and I knew nothing about building a website or Photoshop". Greg received help at the beginning from his friend Sean Carter with layout and design of the website and some of the original code that was made over 7 years ago is still being used. "This started out purely just for fun. Many of the early cartoons were under that theme. Just fun between friends was always the backbone of the original series." During the last year and a half he received a lot of fan mail, submissions from fans, and other artist's renditions of the characters. "Our characters would appear in other popular online comics and at that time web comics were starting to gain prominence."


## Fall Compost Give Away

Greg stopped working on M.A.C. Studios and put it on hiatus during his last year of college because M.A.C. Studios was a "free time project" and he was finding that his free time was in short supply. The website remained dormant until recently this year when his new project Echo Therapy debuted in July.

When people go to M.A.C studios now they get Echo Therapy where Michael D. Pearen, a character based on elements of Greg's life, who finds no one is telling him what to do anymore. Working the same job he had since High school, Michael deals with dayto-day life while trying to develop his passion for art more time and energy is required for Echo Therapy than the original M.A.C. strips. comics would take me roughly 10 hours to write and draw every week. Now I spend almost three times as much time taking reference photos and traditionally inking each panel (instead of using the computer) and scanning into my computer where I can render segments, add my text and work with each image until I have achieved what I feel captures what direction and mood I am trying to portray to my readers."

So why do it? "It's something that has to be done. You just don't feel right unless you're doing it properly as they say about writers: 'a writer writes'. The same is true of all artists. The website is my outlet. Unfortunately the internet is an enormous place and there is a chance no one will notice what you're doing so in the end you can't do it for the money and you can't do it for the fan mail. You have to be doing it for yourself. You have to do it because it's what you love to do.

he 1960 US election campaign which brought JFK to the presidency, was notable for the depths to which the candidates sank. Surprisingly the lowest blow was dealt by JFK.
