he greeting card industry is full of innovative and wonderful ideas. There is nothing like getting a card or invitation made especially for you. This is a unique touch that can be done for very little but will make a lasting impression.

I am so picky; it has to be very different because I can't stand ordinary (hence, my husband Rory). The key word here is THOUGHT-FUL. If your gift or sentiment is thoughtful, then who could ask for more, and thoughtful seldom costs much. The best place to start is to really think about to whom you are sending the card. What are their likes and dislikes? What is their favorite colour? Flower? Sport? Hobby?... you get the idea.

My neighbour Carol suffered a heart attack a while back; thankfully she made a miraculous recovery and is doing very well. Remembering that she adores our dog Phoebe, I looked through old pictures on the computer and found a very cute one and made up a card. It was a picture of Phoebe with her head on the floor and I got down to

the same level (only time I will admit that) the caption read "Feeling down Carol" and inside I wrote - "Hope you get up to your old tricks in no time" Well, that card was the talk of the street. It meant the world to Carol that I took the time to personalize it and Phoebe looked darned cute. That wouldn't work on everyone but Carol loves Phoebe therefore it struck a chord. That's what I mean about finding out their likes.

For my friend's baby shower, I saw a birth announcement idea in a magazine and adapted it to this project. downloaded a diaper shape and cut and folded it out of beautiful paper complete with ribbon in lieu of pins. affixed that to a note card approximately 3"x5" which I made from card stock. On the inside I made a little pocket of coordinating paper and inserted a business card (you can make it fancy if you wish) with the following:

Simply Fudgy Brownies

1/4 cup baking cocoa 1/2 vegetable oil 2 eggs 1-cup sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1/8 tsp. Salt 1/2 cup chopped walnuts 1/2 cup chocolate chips

In a small bowl, combine cocoa and oil until smooth. In another bowl beat eggs. Add the sugar, vanilla and cocoa mixture. Mix well. Stir in flour and salt just until

moistened. Fold in walnuts.

Pour into a greased 8-inch square pan, sprinkle with chocolate chips. Bake at 325 for 30 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack.

For the fair I did not use the chocolate chips but iced them because the class called for them iced. But for the lunch box the chips would be better than icing. But you may wish to omit the nuts since most schools are conscious of nut allergies.

For the same couple I made up thank you cards for their baby shower with a picture of them as babies themselves and cropped it to look as though they were cuddling. That was a big hit. I have also seen this idea used at weddings, on wine bottle labels, place cards etc.

Another pretty cool idea I came up with was for the Fairy Princess Birthday party. When I think of fairy tales what first comes to mind is a book of course! So I made an invitation look like a sto-

rybook complete with bookmark. The outside read: Once upon a time: Inside read: There was a Fairy Princess named Ally. I called the location the kingdom, and to rsvp to Queen Heather, the possibilities were endless. Just go with it!

There is so much you can do to really make a card, invitation or announcement special just keep in mind that not only are you acknowledging someone, but by putting extra thought into and personalizing it you are telling him or her that they are special. Isn't that the point anyway! Being thoughtful costs very little but means so much!


