



Changes in Town of Milton proposed Animal By-Law

he first draft of the Animal By-Law in the Town of Milton presented last month had drawn a vociferous crowd to the Council Chambers. The proposal contained some inconsistencies and there was a great deal of negative feedback with over 60 residents of Milton attending the public information session. Over 200 Emails poured into the Town on this issue as the public expressed their concern with the proposed limits on keeping small birds and animals. ## Burlington Short 26 Physicians Province agrees to help

he Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care recently designated the City of Burlington as 'underserviced' in terms of its number of practising family physicians.

The designation resulted from an application submitted by the Burlington Physician Recruitment and Retention Task Force to the Ministry's Underserviced Area Program (UAP) in an effort to bring more physicians to the area. Based on the application, the Ministry determined that, using a ratio of one physician to every 1,380 residents, Burlington should have a total of 109 family physicians. This means Burlington officially has 26 vacancies.

The task force, headed by Regional Councillor Joan Lougheed, comprises representatives from the City of Burlington, Halton Region, the offices of MP Paddy Torsney and MPP Cam Jackson, Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital and the Burlington Chamber of Commerce.

"We are very pleased the Ministry approved the application to designate Burlington as an 'underserviced' community," said Regional Chairman Joyce Savoline. "As a result of this designa-Continued on page 3
