Max, a successful lawyer, and his wife, Wynn, a therapist and writer of self-help books, have invited long-time friends of fifteen years, Abby and Roger to their country retreat. Roger, who has given up his job as a teacher to pursue writing, has so far managed half a screenplay. Abby manages a successful ladies-wear business.

The poster and programme suggest a cheerful, idyllic weekend in luxurious surroundings, an impression furthered by our first sight of the stage set. However, our vision of a serene country idyll among friends is shattered by Max's opening line - a sentiment echoed later by Roger. And events spiral off from there.

Max thinks Roger is jealous of his success; Roger is still annoyed at being stiffed for drinks a year ago. The ladies, expressing undying friendship, nevertheless manage to make a few sweet but cutting comments.

The truth and lies of a friendship come to the surface in this fast-moving, witty comedy of manners.

The play is produced and directed by husband and wife team, Micki and Jim Clemens who have worked together since the late 60's. In the past six years, Jim has produced several shows with Burloak, while Micki has worked mainly backstage. She recently produced her first show for the Burloak Theatre Group, the highly successful *I Remember Mama*.

### No-build bylaw in core areas North of Highway 5

A plan to put a freeze on construction for a one-year period in mixed use areas in North Oakville implements an "interim control bylaw" for one year from Monday to prevent landowners in defined areas from constructing a building on their property or an addition to an existing building The purpose of the bylaw is to allow time for a study to be conducted of the Urban Mixed Use Areas as shown in the Preliminary Draft North Oakville East and West Secondary Plans.

#### New name for OTMH foundation

The Oakville Trafalgar Memorial Hospital (OTMH) Charitable Corporation has a new look and a new name - Oakville Hospital Foundation. The name change is meant to facilitate the public's recognition of the hospital's fundraising organization and to increase community awareness of it.

#### Places to Grow

About 200 people attended a meeting that looked at the Province's recently released growth management strategy discussion paper, Place to Grow: Better Choices, Brighter Future, a document aimed at stopping urban sprawl and focusing compact development on 11 priority urban centres and 15 emerging urban centres. ### More West Nile mosquitoes in Oakville

Halton Region Health Department received confirmation Monday of another southeast Oakville mosquito trap testing positive for West Nile virus (WNV). It was the third positive result from a mosquito trap in southeast Oakville in the past month. The finding suggests there may be increased WNV activity in the area bounded approximately by Sixteen Mile Creek, the QEW, Winston Churchill Boulevard and Lake Ontario. To protect yourself from the virus: wear lightcoloured, loose-fitting clothing made of densely woven material including long sleeves, pants, socks and a hat; use a mosquito repellant containing DEET; ensure window and door screens are in good condition.
