

Wimbledon

hen Peter Colt gets his W wild card to go to Wimbledon, the stakes are high and his career hinges on this last professional tournament. Once ranked eleventh in the world, Colt comes to Wimbledon bumped back to a miserable rank of one hundred and nineteen. With the announcement of his voluntary retirement after the tournament, Colt goes up against some of the



world's finest tennis players in the battle to win the tournament. When his winning streak is compounded by an unexpected love affair with an American tennis player Lizzy Bradbury (played by Kirsten Dunst), Colt is forced to butt heads with her overprotective father and coach in an effort to win her time and affection.


With Colt and Lizzy both competing to win their respective categories at Wimbledon, the pair develop quite the relationship between warm-ups and tennis matches. Lizzy's driven attitude toward tennis eventually spills over into her personal life though she eventually relinquishes her hard-nosed approach to life. Throughout the tournament the pair cheer each other on in their various matches. Although the couple hits some rocky waters, their relationship eventually helps Colt get to the finals in the tournament.

In addition to the dreamy storyline, the film depicts some great examples of camera distortions that magnify the importance of the tournament scenes. Several important moments during the final matches were comprised of slow motion and freeze frames that blur out images of unimportant visual aspects in the shot. These slow motion sequences ritualize and solemnize the movement of the players and often the crowd watching the tennis matches. Quick cutting during the match scenes also gave way to several different camera shots such as aerial shots of the stadium and tilted perspectives of the serving player. The aerial shots of the various tennis matches effectively brings the audience into the world of the tournament while the tilted perspective of Colt during his serves emphasized the spatial and psychological relationship between himself and the ball.

Working Title Productions does a fabulous job of continuing their habits of creating an ageless romantic comedy. The film is suitable for tennis lovers as well as those who don't know anything about the sport. While Wimbledon's romantic comedy genre may make it appear predictable, audiences will be pleasantly surprised at the entertainment value of the film. It is rated PG-13 for language, sexuality and partial nudity.
