> more unusual herbs such as banana minf and burnet. As well, changing ethnicity patterns in the GTA have seen a shift to the production of more greens and hot peppers than in the past.

> The tour concluded at Halton Place Horse and Country in Acton. This 200 acre property is a world class equestrian facility. Halton Place is owned by Timur Leckebusch, who has competed extensively in the German National Junior Show Jumping Team, the World Cup and Grand Prix classes in Canada, as well as the U.S.A. The farm features an outdoor competition sand ring, an outdoor competition Grand Prix ring, two sand warm-up rings and a manicured

The message heard throughout the day from the attendees is that Halton region values its farms, and sees events such as the Farm Tour as a vital way to stay in communication with farmers and keep updated on the issues facing them. Greenfield's Lorenz Eppinger welcomed the opportunity to directly address elected officials about his concerns about cross contamination from farms using genetically modified seeds or from golf courses using pesticides, affecting his organic produce. "The challenges aren't pests and disease," he told them. "The overall problem is what is happening around us."
