### Lions Sports Park opens its doors at last

People in Milton have been waiting over eight years for this day to happen. Milton finally has a location in town where people of all ages can come to enjoy sport. The grand opening of Milton's Lions Sports Park will take place on October 2. The 27 acre park is located on the east side of Thompson Road just south of Main Street.

The featured attraction at Lions Sports Park is the skate half-quarter pipe, the foundation for which was poured in the springtime. This is a permanent 8,500 square foot skate park, complete with stainless steel rails. Many young residents of Milton have waited for this day; since the closest skate park in the area are those in Georgetown and Oakville and are only accessible by car. For the young people of Milton it now means that they don't have to travel far to practice their skills in a safe environment away from traffic.

The park also features several soccer fields; a slo-




pitch field; child's play jungle gym with monkey bars; swings and a clubhouse laid out along beautifully landscaped garden pathways.

The official ribbon cutting for the park will be on October 2nd starting at 11 am. There will be live entertainment as well as a BBQ; kite making, and BMX and Skate Boarding demonstrations.


