ome décor shops seem Lto pop up everywhere and they start to look alike. But every once in a while, a store comes along that you find yourself returning to again and again. You may even tell your

And it was only approximately 8 miles away from their old location!

Even a short move can be a huge undertaking yet McConnell and Kirkland managed to pack things up and relocate to their new place in two short weeks.

One week was reserved to pack up and the second was dedicated to the task of unpacking and getting settled. The ladies admit that husbands, in-laws and a number of select friends are responsible for getting them up and running in a tight period of time. "We owe them!" laughs Kirkland.

Their doors opened for business Saturday, November 6 at 10:00 am with one half of their visitors comprising of visiting tourists and the other half being established customers who received their move notification and wanted to see what the ladies had done.

The official "Grand" opening has yet to be announced but will likely fall sometime in December.
