he Green Belt is too large and growing. It appar-____ ently increased by at least 50% from the task force to Bill 135. It has the potential, given pre election promises by McGinty, to extend all the way to OTTAWA. A large portion of that area is already designated as the Algonquin to Adirondack (A2A) "protected" area to facilitate the movement of wildlife across the border and ensure they do not lack genetic diversity ie. prevent inbreeding. The Ministry of Natural Resources is more worried about that then food production or deer collisions on our roads...

I was actively involved in the opposition to the Niagara Escarpment Plan process. The one and only time we made any real progress was in June 1982 when we held a protest meeting at the Orangeville Race track and attracted about 1500 people to hear politicians and land owners object to the size and restrictions of the proposed plan. Miraculously the next iteration of the plan was shrunk by about 44%. Politicians and bureacrats do not like to see crowds of objectors. As long as we do not object strongly they just put more land into the plan and ignore our polite, Canadian, briefs and laments.

The first thing we should do is post all private

land in the GB. Do they really think some one whom has just lost most of their assests will welcome a new hiking trail?. Boycott is a great Irish tradition used to temper the English landlords during the potato famine.

We need land owners property rights legislation at both the Federal and provincial level.
