

Play Review ~ City of Angels

here were many characters but ___ considerably fewer actors, as most of the cast assumed more than one role for the Georgetown Globe's Production City of Angels.

The play is a spoof of 1940's style detective movies, starring male leads Mark Llewellyn in the part of Stone, a fictional private eye, and Pat McManus him. The action goes back and forth from Stine's real life to that of his characters, whom he is in the process of writing throughout the show.

Set changes were almost unnoticeably smooth and costume changes were lightening fast, as the chameleon-like actors switched from character to character. For the audience, seeing the same face as two different people emphasized the point that characters in a play are often based on actual people who make an impression on an author's life.

There is an amazing amount of talent in Georgetown and surrounding area,

and the Globe took on a project of immense proportions with City of Angels. Artistic director Craig Marshall and music director Kelly Baker, along with choreographer Diane Spence and producers Jane Adair, Melissa Fischer, Jen Marshall and Heather Sanderson orchestrated the production to near perfection.

Stand out performances were given portraying Stine, the author who creates by female leads Cheyenne Harvey in the roles of Miss Oolie and Donna, and by Sonia Kats, playing Bobbi and Gabby. The talented Neil Salinas stole every scene he was in, as he portrayed both Lieutenant Munoz and Pancho Vargas. The accompanying orchestra and the vocal talent of the 40's inspired Angel City Five added to the atmosphere and enjoyment.

The Terminal

"The Terminal" tells the story of Viktor Navorski, a visitor to New York from Eastern Europe, whose homeland erupts in a fiery coup while he is in the air en route to America. Stranded at Kennedy airport with a passport from nowhere, he is unauthorized to actually enter the United States and must improvise his days and nights in the terminal's international lounge until the war at home is over. As the weeks and months stretch on, Viktor finds the compressed universe of the terminal to be a richly complex world of absurdity, generosity, ambition, amusement, status, serendipity, and even romance with a beautiful flight attendant named Amelia. But Viktor has long worn out his welcome with airport official Frank Dixon, who considers him a bureaucratic glitch, a problem he cannot control but wants desperately to erase.
