

## Brampton's proposed highway upsets some Halton Hills residents

Councillor Somerville says Brampton is dumping its traffic on Halton Hills

t least two Halton Hills residents believe their community is being ignored by the City of Brampton as that municipality studies the possibility of developing a north-south highway. One proposed route for the six-lane highway takes in portions of the southern part of

ing on November 29 at Huttonville Public School in Brampton hosted by the City of Brampton. The meeting was held to discuss the Terms of Reference for the proposal as well as a proposed parkway in the Bramwest section of the city, a new development area that is in the southwestern portion of Brampton. The City of Brampton is considering making the parkway an arterial road that would link up with the proposed highway. Brampton is the only proponent involved with the proposal, although Adrian Smith, who works as a manager of growth management and special policy for the city, says that Brampton has been in contact with Halton Region and the Town of Halton Hills.

Mr. Collier says this is the second meeting he's attended regarding the

Terms of Reference. At the first meeting, held earlier in November at the City of Brampton, he tried to have his concerns addressed, but he found the whole process frustrating. "At no time did they mention Halton. They said they were not concerned with Halton." In his opinion,

the agenda is still being driven primarily by Brampton. Mr. Collier says Brampton is "trying to take a massive development and pull

it all together and put a road through it."

Mr. Collier was not alone in his criticisms of the proposal. Halton Hills Councillor Clark Somerville, who has been vocal in his opposition to the proposal, said in an interview that Brampton is simply trying to solve its traffic problems by "dumping traffic into Halton Hills." Mr. Somerville said a resolution was passed recently by Halton Hills Council noting that the proposal is premature, and the document has been sent to the City of Brampton, Peel Region, and the Region of Halton. If the proposed route goes through Halton Hills, it would be going through an area where there are no long term plans in place for land use, explained Mr. Somerville. "It (the proposed route through Halton Hills) would cut through prime farmland and our indus-
