

The Gift of Warmth

Diane Crawford has enjoyed living in Georgetown for thirty years now.

This year marks the tenth anniversary of Diane and her husband Bob, owning Georgetown Yarn & Crafts, on Guelph Street, and seven years since Diane came up with her idea to help give back to the community which has been so good to her.

In 1997, the Guelph Street business owner devised a plan that was put into action by not only Diane, but her customers as well. Crawford gives out free pat-

terns to her clients, who in turn, knit or crochet squares, using donated recycled yarn, which is then sewn together to make warm, colourful blankets. Three years later, the project was expanded to include mittens. This year *Georgetown Yarn & Crafts* will be donating over 500 blankets and over 1000 pairs of mittens to local people in need.

This is a year-round project, and the goods are donated to both Acton and Georgetown branches of the Salvation Army, the Georgetown Bread Basket, Halton Women's Place, in Milton, and the Halton Hills Community Support & Information Centre.
