The Study

The City of Guelph, through their consultants, Stantec Consulting Limited and Associated Engineering Ltd., commissioned a Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) in support of water treatment improvements for the Arkell Well/Collectors and Carter Well Supplies. Upgrades to the system must be undertaken to facilitate disinfection upgrades to ensure compliance with the new Ontario Drinking Water Regulation 170/03. In addition, the City is proactively undertaking further repairs and upgrades to maintain the reliability and security of this supply.

The proposed upgrades include:

- Construction of a UV facility at the F.M. Woods Treatment Plant for the treatment of all water supplies from the Arkell Spring Ground and Carter wells;
- · Construction of a replacement aqueduct at the Arkell Spring Ground east of Watson Road:
- · Upgrades to the Artificial Recharge System at the Arkell Spring Ground including reinforcing the pump platform and construction of a new pumphouse, construction of a maintenance access bridge and a small control facility on shore;
- · Reconstruct the Carter wellhouse to house both wells and upgrade the piping and control equipment inside;
- · Install connections for standby power at each wellhouse at the Arkell Spring Ground.

The Process

The Study was conducted in accordance with the Municipal Engineers Association's Class Environmental Assessment process. The Class EA addressed health related disinfection upgrades and did not include an increase in permitted capacities.

Environmental Screening Document

An Environmental Screening Document (ESD) has been completed to document the planning and decision-making processes followed by this project. The ESD will be available for public review starting on Wednesday, January 5th, 2005 for thirty (30) calendar days at the following locations (Monday to Friday, 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM):

During this thirty (30) day public review period, anyone who has an outstanding concern with the project, which cannot be resolved in a discussion with the City of Guelph, may request that the Minister of the Environment make an order for the project to comply with Part II of the Environmental Assessment Act, which addresses individual environment assessments.
