HDSB votes to end school closure studies

I alton District School Board trustees who voted to end school closure studies with the hope that new provincial guidelines will allow for new schools while old ones operate below capacity have definitely taken a gamble, says Dusty Papke, Director of Education.

For hundreds of students in growth areas such as Georgetown and Milton it will mean making do if the expected changes don't materialize.

"In the short term it will mean we will have to find alternate arrangements, either with portables or

bussing to other schools," said Papke.

Paul Tate, Chair of the Board, doesn't see the move as a gamble. He says that Gerard Kennedy, Minister of Education, has given indications for six months at least, that the current policy is not practical.

Tate is also emphatic that pitting one neighbourhood against another is no way to educate students.

"It seems to me, and to some others; that programming is what we're all about - teaching kids," says Tate, who doesn't want to see kids in either overcrowded or underutilized schools, both having a negative affect on programs.

The issue of how much risk has been taken will be resolved in the near future according to Ministry of Education spokesperson Wilma Davis. Although unable to provide a precise date, Davis advises that an announcement from the province is due shortly, possibly within weeks.

It's the possibility that they've gambled and lost that bothers Ether Gardiner, Trustee for Wards 1, 2, 3, 4 and Halton Hills and a dissenting voice on the recent vote.

"From my perspective, I was very, very disappointed not to move forward with closure studies," said Ethel Gardiner.

Gardiner-figures that if the province's new rules allow the board to build despite having excess capacity in areas such as south Oakville and Burlington, all will be well. If not, growth areas will

be in a mess.

"It's not easy to close schools, people love schools, but we need to look at how to accommodate all children across Halton," says Gardiner.

re definitely taken a gamble, says Dusty Papke, sector of Education. She notes that areas such as Georgetown south are undergoing incredible growth, with a huge development of over 2000 homes coming in.

"We'll be right back to where we started before Silver Creek," she says.

Silver Creek, a 650-student capacity school is already at 800 and no new school is slated for Georgetown until 2008.

Elaine Westerhof, Manager of Planning for the board, has the numbers to back this up. Projections for the 2005/2006 school year indicate that the board has 230 students more than they currently have spaces for.

Both Gardiner and Tate point out that Milton is another hot spot with the Sherwood development creating a bulge there.

Tate observes that despite the construction of a new school on Bennett Street, Milton could still be in crisis.

"I'm really glad we still have Martin Street, it will be a holding school for all the kids that will be coming into the new Sherwood development," he says.

Acton, also undergoing development, will fare somewhat better as McKenzie-Smith Bennett Public School is currently operating under its 670-student capacity and Gardiner feels the school will be able to handle the new growth.

For Halton Hills it means pushing the date for building the new school back and creating an over-capacity situation for the schools already in the community.

Tate and Gardiner agree that the current situation speaks to looking at needs in individual communities, a problem for a large regional board like Halton that is in a growth situation.

"The fact that we have surplus spaces in Burlington doesn't help us at all," says Gardiner.
