## Elizabeth Wilkes Hoey Art Exhibition

he Textile Museum of Canada located at 55 Centre Avenue at the St. Patrick Subway in Toronto is hosting a special exhibition entitled, "Thor Hansen: Crafting a Canadian Style" featuring the works of one of his contemporaries, Nassagaweya designer Elizabeth Wilkes Hoey. The show is scheduled to run from January 19th, through to and including April 3, 2005.

From the mid-1950's to the end of the 1960's, Danish émigré, Thor Hansen (1903-1974) was a popular artist, designer and tireless promoter of the craft movement in Canada and is currently facing a re-emergence. His work is being displayed at the exhibition and hosts the works of Hoey, honouring a unique blend of history and creativity.

Many of Hoey's original Silk Screen Show Lengths, as well as The National Film Board's ten-minute movie clip detailing her numerous works will be on hand to view.

Hoey is best known and respected for her uncanny ability to bring forth the subtleties of nature within her creations. Many fine artists and established businesses, such as The Royal Botanical Gardens, The Art Gallery of Ontario, Edwards Gardens, Queen's Park and the MacDonald-Stewart Art Gallery, recognize her design techniques.

One of her proudest works, a handprinted silk screen drapery called the "Jack in the Pulpit", is just one of the gorgeous pieces you will view at the exhibition.

In 1954, she moved to the "Elm Tree Centre" (www.elmtreecentre.com), a facility that offers lifeenhancing courses that teach balance between one's practical and creative sides. Hoey and Martha, a fellow artist and Life Skills Consultant, stand by their slogan, "Where the Heart Leads the

Way" because guests who step inside their doors make lifestyle changes in an understandable, approachable manner.

As an addition to her long list of accomplishments, Hoey won the "John Robarts Award" for her Trillium design and has the appreciation and recognition of many fine art collectors throughout the world.

Hoey is also world-renowned for her watercolour work and designing expressions. Her wide variety of media ranges from the "Angels of Healing" greeting cards to ceramic tile paintings and original creations with feathers.

One of the last large orders Elizabeth produced was the handdesigned silk screen printed draperies that were done for the Halton County Court House. She has also designed the crest for the Township of Nassagaweya, which hangs in the Township Hall in Brookville.




## Milton Library Sesquicentennial celebration
