irector James L. Brooks does it again with this romantic comedy starring Tea Leoni and Adam Sandler as Mr. and Mrs. Clasky. Told in the consistent

format of a voiceover narration, the film follows the story of a young girl's journey with her mother from Mexico into the depths of the United States and her essay application to a prestigious American University. Speaking only Spanish, the mother (Flor) played by Paz Vega manages to find work and solace in the Mexican village near her home. When work becomes scarce, Flor is forced to look for work outside of her comfort zone of Spanish speaking people and journey into the suburbs as a maid for a white-collar family.

Finding it difficult to continue working there with no knowledge of the English language, Flor reluctantly asks her daughter Christina for help in learning the new tongue. When Flor and her daughter are eventually forced into moving in with the Clasky family, Christina is immediately taken under the wing of the urban family mother Deborah and praised for her beauty. Neglecting her own daughter in the meantime, Deborah's growing relationship with Christina becomes only a part of a pattern of betrayal that plagues Deborah's family until the climax of the film.

Rated PG-13 for some sexual content and language use, this film does a spectacular job of going beyond the typical conventions of a Hollywood crowd-pleaser. The story moves beyond what audiences would expect, and instead demonstrates the bond that unites two culturally different but caring parents who are devoted to their children in very similar ways. Playing a role completely opposite to his usual characters, Sandler's Mr. Clasky is a serious example of what it means to 'have it all'. His blooming career as a chef and the uncommonly open and trusting relationship he has with his adolescent daughter reminds audiences that Sandler's scope of abilities has only been touched on in his previous films. Although I wouldn't recommend this film for younger audiences because of the adult content in some areas, it is a great demonstration of what it means to sacrifice for the love of your children.

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


