veryone has heard the expres-I sion in dating that nobody is good enough for my son or daughter. There are tons of hilarious films out there about the horrible father or mother who terrorizes their children's dates only to realize that they have to let them grow up and be their own person... but what happens when the parent starts dating and the kids don't approve? Are We There Yet is the sidesplitting comedy that tells audiences the story of a bombshell divorcee Suzanne (played by Nia Long) whose children become a little too overprotective of their mother on the dating scene.

Encouraged by a friend at work, Nick (Ice Cube) notices the beautiful Suzanne working across the street from his sports collectible shop and tries to get a date with her on the spot. While their romance does not exactly flourish from the beginning, Nick befriends Suzanne and her children and eventually offers to help her get her children to Vancouver where she is on assignment working. What Nick does not realize however, is that Suzanne's children Lindsey and Kevin, think that nobody is good enough for their mother and take every chance they get to let him know that he is unwelcome.

Throughout the film there are several comedic sketches that play on physical humour reminiscent of the Home Alone films from the nineties. For Nick and his brand new Lincoln Navigator, these sketches become a series of unfortunate events that eventually end in the demise of his vehicle. The resulting story is a comical film full of laughs for both parents and children alike. Although in some Ontario theatres the film is rated G, meaning that it is appropriate for all audiences, the MPAA rating for the film is PG (Parental Guidance recommended) because of some language issues and crude humour. If you can get past the crude slapstick style, you'll find this film a refreshing story of what it means to be a family in present day society.
