

Movie Etiquette: A list of guidelines

ou're sitting in a theatre all nestled into your seat and ready for the impending film. Your popcorn bowl is full and the movie begins when all of a sudden, the person beside you gets a call on their cellular phone. And it isn't just any old ring either; it's an irritating downloadable ring tone that sounds like the latest rap song magnified a thousand times by the quiet environment. After going to see Spanglish a few weeks ago, it became apparent to me that a little movie going etiquette was necessary in order to vent my frustrations with the general public at the movies. So, here are a few rules to keep in mind when going to the theatre. They will make your experience and the experiences of those around you a whole lot more enjoyable!

Turn Off Those Cell Phones!!!

This includes all forms of wireless communication: Cell phones, pagers, text-messaging tools, Blackberrys, etc. While the vibrate mode is acceptable in most theatres, your neighbours will still find it irritating if you have to keep getting up to take calls or answer pages. Unless your communication is life threatening or your job absolutely requires you to have it on, TURN IT OFF! If you need to be reached while you're in the theatre, maybe you shouldn't be there in the first place!

Respect MPAA ratings

Do not bring your six year old to a film that is rated R just because you cannot get a babysitter. When your child leaves the theatre using all sorts of new expletives you might realize why the rating is put in place.

Take responsibility and go to a more appropriate show or go another night when little Johnny or Suzy can go to a babysitter. **Use Your Manners!** When you're going up to grab your snack for the movie, don't forget to say please and

thank you. Most of the employees work late hours at theatres so be patient. If your particular movie of choice is sold out, please don't yell at the ticket cashier. They cannot manufacture more seating! Next time

arrive earlier or buy your tickets in advance. **Arrive On Time**

So you don't like watching previews no big deal. But stepping over half of a row of people to get into that middle seat just isn't polite! Smashing people's toes, getting in the way of their view and spilling food is not the way to win over fellow audience members when you need to find a place to sit in the theatre. Instead, try finding an aisle seat or merely say excuse me as you pass by. Manners go a long way!

Don't talk

Now this rule may seem like common sense but I cannot count the number of times I've gone to see a movie and instead heard the entire life story of the person behind me. If you have to talk a little during the film, make sure to whisper. Making ongoing comments throughout the film however is frustrating to those around you who actually want to hear the film and not you. This rule is especially important if you are seeing the film for the second time. Please do not ruin the film by narrating what is about to happen to your neighbor. They may not mind but the rest of the audience can usually hear you and do not want to waste their ten dollars!

Bathroom Trips

If you absolutely have to go use the restroom in the middle of the film, be sure and say excuse me as you pass by your neighbour. If you're a regular offender, be sure and sit on the aisle where it's more convenient to get up and down out of your seat.

Cups and Wrappers

This is simple, pick them up and put them into the garbage! Nobody wants to step in your half finished bag of popcorn or crunch over a discarded chocolate bar wrapper as they move through the aisles. Common courtesy and a respect for the workers who have to clean the theatre after every show means picking up your mess.

While babies are cute and can be well behaved, theatres now cater to new parents and their tots. "Stars and Strollers" at Cineplex Odeon is one example of this new service offered by movie theatres. The films are all new releases, however, they are played at a softer volume level and audiences consist of other parents. Taking your screaming child out of a movie played at other prime times is disruptive to the audience but also embarrassing to the parent. Do everyone a favour and take advantage of these new services or hire a babysitter for the evening.

While this list is not all encompassing, it does address most of the issues people have when going to see a film. If you are going to see a movie, try using common sense and being respectful of other audience members, and above all else, do not forget the popcorn!
