## Friday Night Fever

eadowvale Theatre patrons may be enjoying their very own Friday night fever given the number of sick children in the audience at the Milton Youth Theatre Production's (MYTP) rendition of *Friday Knight Fever* on February 17.

Produced by Kim Belvedere and directed by Christine Houle it was an entertaining piece of theatre marred mostly by the number of hacking and coughing young patrons, obviously on hand to witness the budding thespian talents of family and friends.

Putting their best food forward, the MYTP did their best to bring off the amusing and eclectic concoction based on the book by Rachel Davidson with lyrics and music by Bill Francoeur.

Friday Knight Fever is a tribute to everything 70's right down to flashbacks in the form of the Brady Bunch with characters named Bobby, Peter, Greg, Marsha, Jan and Cindy and props of magic 8 balls, roller skates (the kind with four wheels), psychedelic clothing and some seriously wild hair.

A multi-layered plot with jewel thieves, chess players, a beleaguered roller rink owner and budding love, the play makes a light-hearted attempt to paint the 70's as the decade that saw feminism blossom and disco reign.

An almost believable premise, unless of course, you were actually there. Some say the decade was a little more about sex and drugs and rock and roll than perhaps most tail end boomers would care to remember.

Katie Preisner as Eileen, provided the cast with a strong vocal presence and David Burchett's performance as Danny, the misguided and angry loser was quite believable.

Natalie Paterson and Sarah Stockall as the female undercover cops disguised as construction workers gave a smooth and solid performance with the added bit of reality and comic relief at the end of the play, when some long hair got caught in the workings of a hard hat.

The cast did a reasonable recreation of some of John Travolta's more memorable Saturday Night Fever moves in their dance numbers, the only thing missing was strobe lights bouncing off a disco ball.

Actually, a couple of other things were missing as well. Let's see, no Cheech and Chong, Aerosmith, Queen, Styx, Van Halen, Bob Segar, Fleetwood Mac...
