Future of farming under Greenbelt questioned

mid high emotions at a planning and public works meeting in Halton on February 23 more than 30 delegates pled the case of 4,700 acres of land with the committee ultimately deciding not to request rescission from the Provincial Greenbelt Plan.

Split about evenly for and against, delegates from across Halton including landowners, farmers and other interested parties, cited reasons that primarily fell into the categories of land devaluation, the environment and the sustainability of farming.

Gloria Hildebrandt, spokesperson for the group, Protect Our Water and Environmental Resources (POWER), believes the lands should be a part of the greenbelt. Her group supports the preservation of land and natural environment, noting that these lands serve as the lungs of the GTA. POWER is also concerned about the food supply.

"Farming is critical to southern Ontario," she said.


But Burt Andrews, of Andrews Scenic Acres, doesn't think that farming, and the issues facing the agri-business are on the radar anywhere.

"The name tells a story - not a word about agriculture in the name," he said of the greenbelt's title.

Many of the speakers cited concerns about land values and tempers flared at the suggestion of speculation.

"Don't try to paint me as a speculator, Mr. Elgar," said an antagonistic Rick Stull. "These people are not speculators, they're farmers and you're hurting them."

ilton town council easily passed La motion on Monday night to add transparency and clarity to its guiding principles for public consultation, but the motion was not without its detractors.


