early ten years after the original film entitled "The Mask" Jim starring the Carey, Mask of Loki returns in this sequel, "Son Of The Mask", to wreak havoc on an unsuspecting family in the suburbs. When the magi-



cal mask reappears in a stream and is found by an adorable Jack Russell terrier named Otis, the comedy begins for the Avery family. Ignorant of its powers, cartoonist Tim Avery, played by Jamie Kennedy, accidentally discovers just how fierce the mask's powers are while at a Halloween party. When Tim gets exposed as the masked man, coworkers are so impressed by his abilities that the boss takes notice and promotes him as a cartoonist.

Just when the Avery's lives seem to be coming together, Mrs. Avery announces her pregnancy and delivers a child with some very unique gifts. Possessed by the powers of the mask, the family's jealous dog takes on the new baby in a struggle for control. The resulting storyline is a hilarious combination of special effects and adorable close up shots of the Avery's baby. Throughout the film the baby and the dog each get their fair share of visual enhancements made with animation. Although the distortions are difficult to detect unless they are extreme, the appeal of a cute baby speaking in a voice akin to James Earl Jones is enough to make anybody laugh uncontrollably. Using a variety of visual effects combined with hugely exaggerated prosthetics throughout the film, "Son Of The Mask" is a film that anybody, including families, can enjoy.

With an MPAA rating of PG, for action, crude and suggestive humor, and language, this film is fairly tame and easily comprehensible for younger viewers. Running a full hour and twenty-six minutes, "Son Of The Mask" is a definite crowd pleaser for a lazy weekend afternoon.

Georgetown Bach Chorale Annual Spring Festival

The Spring Festival begins on Good Friday, March 25, at Knox Presbyterian Church with a choral concert. The choir will be accompanied by a baroque orchestra. The orchestra musicians will all be playing period instruments with Andras Molner on baroque trumpet. The Chorale will sing the second part of Handel's Messiah and selections from Bach's St. Matthew and St. John's Passions. Joining the choir for the opening chorus of the St. Matthew Passion and the Hallelujah Chorus of the Messiah will be a nine member children's vocal ensemble. Guest soloists for this concert are soprano Abigail Wong and tenor Peter McCutcheon. Tickets are \$25 and the concert starts at 8 pm.

The second concert in the series is at the Library and Cultural Centre Gallery and features the Tokai String Quartet. The quartet

was formed in 2002 and take their name and inspiration from the famous Hungarian dessert wine, a rich and delectable treat. They received international exposure as the only Canadian group invited to compete at the Banff International String Quartet Competition in September of 2004. They will be launching their own concert series this year. Music by the quartet will include works by Haydn and Dvorjak. The quartet will also accompany the Bach Chorale's own artistic director Ron Greidanus for Chopin's Piano Concerto, Opus 11, in e minor. This is sure to be an extraordinary musical experience for those who love chamber music and the gallery has excellent acoustics for a concert of this type. Tickets are \$20 and the concert takes place on Sunday, April 10 at 8 pm.

"The Russian Revolution" is the third concert of the series, taking place at 157 Main Street South and tickets must be purchased in advance. This intimate recital, featuring coloratura soprano Kyra Bailey, will showcase works by the Russian masters Rachmaninoff, Scriabin, and Rimsky-Korsakov. Kyra has performed with the Toronto Symphonietta, Calux Concert Series, Canadian Concert-Artists and on BRAVO! Television. She will be accompanied on piano by Ron Greidanus. Ron has a real affinity for Russian music and Rachmaninoff in particular. He has been invited on several occasions to play for the Rachmaninoff Society both in North America and Europe. Audiences will round out their evening with a reception on a Russian theme. The performance on Friday, April 15 is already sold out but a few tickets still remain for Saturday, April 16. Tickets are \$35 and the concerts start at 8 pm.

The final concert of the Spring Festival series is the Gala Concert. The choir will again perform with baroque orchestra and with soloist Abigail Wong. The Chorale will complete the Resurrection portion of the Messiah and sing Handel's "Zadok the Priest". The orchestra will perform "Spring" from Vivaldi's Four Seasons and Bach's Concerto for Two Violins in d minor. The Chorale will also perform this concert in Caledon East as part of the Caledon Chamber Series. The Caledon performance is on Sunday, May 1 at St. James Anglican Church and starts at 7:30. The Georgetown concert follows a week later on Saturday, May 7 at St. John's United Church at 8 pm. Tickets for each performance are \$25.
