performance. A collective sigh of appreciation was heard when each song was announced.

Highlights of the evening included the band's performance of "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" accompanied by singers Stephanie Kujtan, Sally Kwan and Michelle Willis. TABB's theme song, Sing, Sing, Sing by Benny Goodman, was also memorable. But the number that brought the house down was "Operator". As the TABB Five sang, the band came down from the stage to dance, clap their hands, and generally get the crowd going. It worked.

The Toronto All-Star Big Band offers its young musicians an invaluable experience, but getting in isn't easy. The competition at try-outs is fierce, and only the best are chosen. The band travels all over Ontario and the United States, bringing the music of the big band era to life in the 21st century.
