
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The 32nd Annual Canadian Federation of University Women Book Sale

Midnight at the Dragon Cafe

very Ontario town has one, a small Chinese restaurant that serves "Chinese" and Canadian food. Few know the story behind the scenes; the lives lived by the immigrants who serve them their meals.

In the novel Midnight at the Dragon Cafe, Annie, now an adult, looks back on her 1960's childhood in a small town an hour outside Toronto. She was born in China, coming to Canada with her mother to be re-united with her father. The father, who is much older than the mother, has been running a Chinese restaurant and sending money to support his family in China. Soon after the arrival of his wife and daughter, his adult son, born during his first marriage, joins the household. .

Language, unusual names, different clothing, unfamiliar customs, lack of communications with the local residents, working very long hours at menial tasks, a very limited social life, family pressures to succeed; all these are seen through the eyes of a child in public school. As the child becomes older she becomes aware of an unusual secret within her family, one with the potential to cause great pain.

Even success at school, usually much sought by immigrant parents, can become a sore point between a mother and her child. The mother sees her daughter taking on the ways of the town residents rather than traditional Chinese ways and she feels she is losing control of her daughter.

The difficulties caused by the 1923 laws against Chinese immigration are apparent. Many men came to Canada ahead of their families hoping to soon bring their families to join them. The law was passed before many families could be reunited. Men grew old alone in Canada while their wives and children continued to hope for the possibility to come to Canada. Other men were never able to marry as no suitable women were at hand. Several characters in this novel are in this awkward position.

The unusual secret becomes a serious problem causing considerable family anguish.

Annie's father shows remarkable courage as he " swallows his bitterness", rises above the situation, and continues as head of the family.

This Canadian novel is positive even as it demonstrates the courage and strength brought by many Chinese newcomers to this country.

Set in the fictitious and clanky world of Robot city, the characters in Robots are somewhat reminiscent of The Wizard of Oz. Hoping to find the solutions to their problems, a team of tin friends eagerly follows newcomer Rodney Copperbottom (voice played by Ewan McGreggor) through his adventures as an inventor. As a young genius trying to make the world a better place, Rodney runs into all kinds of issues when he initially leaves the comfort of his parents' home to venture to Robot City. How will he get in touch with Bigweld (Mel Brooks) and get his ideas heard? Where will he stay in the big city? What if companies turn down his inventions and he is forced to go back home? Amidst all this confusion in Robot city, an evil conspirator named Ratchet (played by Greg Kinnear) has taken over Bigweld's company and discontinued all the robotic spare parts spelling trouble for any of the poorer robots who can't afford full upgrades.
