Regional Road 25 Transportation Corridor Highway 401 to north of Campbellville Road, Town of Milton Class Environmental Assessment Study

The Regional Municipality of Halton is initiating a Class Environmental Assessment to consider a wide range of options for transportation corridor improvements to satisfy future travel demands on Regional Road 25, from Highway 401 to just north of Campbellville Road, in the Town of Milton (refer to map below). The need to satisfy north-south capacity requirements in this transportation corridor has been identified in previous studies including the Halton Transportation Master Plan (2004). In order to best address operational deficiencies associated with this segment of Regional Road 25, a number of road improvement alternatives will be examined as part of the study including widening the roadway, cross-sectional elements, intersection improvements, overall traffic operations and the impact of such improvements on the social and natural environments.

This notice signals the commencement of the Class Environmental Assessment - a study which will define the problem, identify and evaluate alternative solutions, and determine a preferred design in consultation with regulatory agencies, and the public. This study is being conducted in compliance with Schedule C of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (June 2000), which is approved under the Ontario Environmental Assessment

A key component of the study will be consultation with interested stakeholders (public and regulatory agencies) at two Public Information Centres (PIC). The PICs will provide stakeholders with an opportunity to meet with the Project Team, review the study scope and discuss issues related to the project including alternative solutions, environmental considerations and evaluation criteria. It is anticipated that the first public meeting will be held in June 2005. Details regarding the forthcoming PICs will be advertised as the study progresses.


