

Since that time he has written a number of best selling financial help books, and been a television personality. He currently is the founder of the Caledon based Credit River Company, which restores and operates heritage commercial properties. It's the quiet things

Regaling the audience with tales of his adventurous youth, Halton Youth Leadership Symposium keynote speaker Neil McCarthy gradually brought students from across Halton Region around to thinking about not going with the flow.

"Try things that are a little different – come out of the comfort zone," exhorted

McCarthy.

McCarthy, a motivational speaker, was a part of a day filled with speakers, workshops and networking for students from both the Halton District School Board and the Halton Catholic District School Board that took place at St. Thomas Aquinas Secondary school in Oakville on April 15.

The goal of the 4th annual conference was to help students foster and interest in their schools and communities and to develop valuable leadership skills that could be used in their day-to-day lives.

McCarthy's humour laden message came primarily through a personal story of his work with a group called *Up with People*, a theatre, dance and comedy troupe that toured the globe and provided community services to their host countries such as visiting the elderly and ill and cleaning beaches.

He reminisced about his first day on the job that entailed a talk from a psychologist who through her own anecdotes, pointed out the folly of waiting until the last minute to start living.

"This is a story you can apply to your own lives no matter where you're at," said McCarthy. Shared also was the wording from a

"You are climbing a majestic mountain; the road is steep and rough – do not climb it alone, look for help."

McCarthy reminded students that the vast majority of their achievements in life would not be along the lines of Nobel prizes and yet they could still expect to make a difference.

"It's the quiet things that we do that leave a lasting impression," he said.

McCarthy is a graduate of Ryerson and has been a radio personality for Toronto rock station Q107. He is also author of Getting It Together, a book that provides a motivational action plan for teenagers and young adults and serves as a World Youth Day resource.
