Citizens show they care about Halton Hills

Although the weather may not have cooperated for this year's Earth Day events, citizens in the Halton Hills region certainly did. Many schools, organizations, businesses, and residents demonstrated their commitment to creating a litter-free community by participating in the clean up events organized and promoted by the Town of Halton Hills.

Jane Fogal, Regional Councillor for the Town of Halton Hills and Chair of the Litter Free Task Force Committee, is delighted by the public's response to the first ever 20-Minute Makeover. "For the 20-Minute Makeover, given it was the first time that we did it, we had great success with it. Leading the way, really, were the town employees. They made a tremendous difference." In a commendable attempt to lead by example, town employees went outdoors on April 22nd to remove unsightly litter from nearby parks, trails, roadsides, and parking lots.

Eight schools also participated in the Makeover. "That's hundreds and hundreds of children who were out doing some clean up," said Fogal. "We know the plan was to take out a lot of kids given the number of gloves and bags they were asking for. Infact, next year we are going to have to arrange for more because we ran out of gloves. So from that point of view, I guess we had more people doing clean up than we had anticipated for the 20-Minute Makeover."

At least a dozen local businesses are known to have participated in the Makeover, but Fogal anticipates a far greater response from the business community next year. "I think there are people who wouldn't have understood what it was to start with, but now that we've done it, and they can see that others have been out there, I think we'll get much more interest, not just from the business owners, but from the employees who might begin asking about it; so, I'm quite sure it's going to grow," said Fogal.

While the 20-Minute Makeover persuaded businesses and residents to focus on tidying their own property, the Halton Hills Clean Up Day on April 23rd was intended to be a town-wide clean up event. Unfortunately the dismal weather forced many businesses and organizations to postpone. As Fogal argues, however, the point is not when the clean up gets done as long as it does get done.

Fogal refers to a few outstanding individuals who are particularly devoted to getting the job done. "Larry Alderbert from the Stewartown area went out on his own cleaning up the Fifteenth Side Road between Main Street and Trafalgar Road, which is a huge undertaking. And he also put up flyers for people in his neighbourhood to try and get some help out there, so he was trying to organize some people and he really took a terrific initiative; he definitely cares passionately about this. And Mr. and Mrs. Porty have once again cleaned up the Twenty-second Side Road, from the Fourth Line to the Third Line. It's a particularly difficult place

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and the truck windows. I went out to help them last year, and they were trying at that time to do from the Fourth Line all the way to Highway 25 — and these are senior citizens," remarked Fogal.

According to Fogal, exceptional people like these are making a noticeable difference in the community. "They're not cleaning up their own property, they're cleaning up somebody else's property, or they're cleaning up town property, and it takes special people to go and do that," commented Fogal. "Lots of people will keep their own place neat and tidy, but getting them to go and clean up some other area is really wonderful. It's really wonderful that we've got citizens that care that much."

Earth Day may be over, but we can all show we care about preserving and enhancing the beauty of Halton Hills by spending just a little time removing the litter we see around us everyday.
