"The membership's message has been very clear - we need fair and competitive taxes, infrastructure that meets the needs of business and taxpayers, and a strong education system" said Len Crispino, President and CEO of the OCC. "We know that if the government provides business with the tools it needs to grow and to expand, the entire province benefits."

"We've always said that business needs to be part of the solution," said Crispino, "The message from our members is very clear - work with government to affect solutions. In the coming days and weeks, we'll be knocking on Premier McGuinty's door letting him know where our 57,000 members stand on the issues of the day."
