RE: Canada's Shame

The last execution in Canada for the murder of an on duty Police officer took place in 1962. In 1975 capital punishment for the murder of an on duty Police officer was removed from the Canadian Criminal Code. What does this say about Canadians? Some say it proves that we are superior to the Americans.

The Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics makes available to the public via the Internet a, Homicide Survey, which was conducted in September 2002. It lists by type of circumstance, a total of 117 on duty Police officers who were murdered in Canada between 1961 and 2001. In April 2005 four more Police murders were added to Canada's list of shame.

In the 1984 general elections, a major federal party promised to restore capital punishment if elected. Once in office, they turned the issue into a free vote in the Commons and the discouragement of the murder of on duty Police officers was rejected.

Apart from municipal elections, ballot measures aren't common in Canada, but there have been a number of referendums. In spite of this, the Canadian people have never been consulted on their opinion concerning the lethal sanctioning of the murder of an on duty Police officer.
