The End of Suburbia'

orth America's addiction to fossil fuels and the possible fallout from oil depletion was the subject of the movie "The End of Suburbia" and the discussion that followed on May 26 at the Meeting Place in Oakville.

"People need to start talking about these issues...we must start taking action to address the very real and present problems before they spiral out of control," said Liz Benneian, organizer of the event.

The 78-long film produced by Barry Silverthorne, documents the history of suburbia; how it sprang from the need for people to escape the filthy, noisy slums that had developed with the Industrial Revolution and has evolved into the sprawling, disconnected and oil dependent landscape of today.

"Cheap fossil fuels make modern life possible," says narrator Barrie Zwicker, a Canadian broadcaster and writer. "And there is no other way of life that uses as much of this energy than suburbia."

The film is a less than flattering look at the North American tendency to conspicuous consumption and the mindset that we can continue on the way we are going.

The film points out that nearly half of our population lives in suburbia and is utterly dependent on fossil fuels and the related technologies and that the absence of those fuels could be catastrophic.

Heating our homes and driving to work are the obvious, but fossil fuels are interwoven in aspects of our lives that we may not consider such as medicine and the food system. Not only are we currently paying to have much of our food shipped to us from around the globe, the yields are also dependent on pesticides and herbicides that are members of the petroleum family.

We would think, says Matthew Simmons, an energy investment banker interviewed for the film, that the black out in August of 2003 would have rung some alarm bells for people.

"We just didn't get it," he notes.

Economic growth is tied, he says to electric energy growth and he believes North America's capacity for growing hydroelectric power is coming to an end.

Not a reassuring outlook, especially when combined with the knowledge that oil production globally is now on the arc of decline and that within five to ten years, the situation could be dire.

The movie is full of interviews of those deemed experts in their field and who shower the viewer with statistics, information and scenarios that most would-likely find distressing and depressing, as the discussion that followed the movie facilitated by Mike Balkwill, showed.

"I think the term 'oil depletion' is about as sexy as long johns," said Oakville M.P.P. Kevin Flynn who attended the screening and discussion and who noted that people have to change their behaviour in terms of consumption and conservation.

The nearly 200 people in the audience were clearly dismayed and, although most were aware of the decline of oil reserves, concerned about how society was going to manage once the wells run dry and were interested in the solutions to the problem.

"We need some kind of massive collective wake up," said Balkwill.
