The Africa House

In Out of Africa, Karen Blixen/Isak Dinesen wrote of her life in Kenya in the 1920's and 1930's. A number of young aristocrats and landed gentry, primarily British but not uniformly, found that life was less restrictive and less expensive in several African colonies than it was at home. Blixen's efforts to run a coffee farm eventually failed, her lover, Denys Finch-Hatton died in an airplane crash and she returned to her native Denmark and a life of writing.

Another of the expatriots was Stewart Gore-Browne who settled in Northern Rhodesia, now Zambia. Gore-Browne was related to many titled British families, however as his inheritance was not large and no grand estate would be forthcoming he decided to take his English money and build a grand house in Africa. And grand it was; large and rambling with a tower, a chapel, many bedrooms, a library and a two storey dining room. His home was filled with European antiques, china dishes bearing the family crest and lots of silver and crystal. Lavish meals and the finest imported wines were served by uniformed staff. There were large European gardens and a brick village for his employees who often numbered over 1000.

Like Blixen, Gore-Browne started with a piece of land in its' natural state; through thousands of hours of work and by spending every penny he had and many he did not have, he turned the 23,000 acre property into a farm with several thousand cattle, citrus groves and gardens producing

essential oils for the perfume industry. Raised as a gentleman, Gore-Browne had to teach his employees how to make bricks for the house and other buildings, how to make wrought iron and how to maintain manicured gardens in the middle of Africa.

Gore-Browne's dealings with Africans were contradictory. His staff called him "Chipembele" or "Rhino" because of his toughness, hard work and explosive temper. At the same tme he was a champion of equal rights for Africans, wanting to see them educated and in positions of power. Kenneth Kaunda, who became President of Zambia, was his protege. Gore-Browne was involved in politics for many years and he played a role in securing Rhodesia's peaceful break with Britain. He is the only white man to be given a state funeral in Zambia.

Gore-Browne's personal life was complex. The love of his life was his aunt, his father's much younger sister. When marriage to her was not possible he chose a woman who rejected him because he had insufficient money, years later after she had died he married her orphaned teenage daughter.

Christina Lamb was travelling in Africa when she encountered the grandson of Gore-Browne, he gave her a tour of the home and access to the thousands of documents stored there. The Africa House, while not as lyrical as Out of Africa, is nonetheless a picture of an interesting time, a fascinating place and a truly extraordinary man.


Juliet spent over four months gathering recipes from friends and family, and then another month putting the book together, designing the cover, proof-reading, editing and

printing. Juliet says, "I have only lived here for 2 years but I really miss the food I grew up with. I myself have had trouble finding a definitive guide to basic British cooking, so I hope that's what I have created with this book."

Bill loved his gift, and so did everyone who saw it, creating a demand for the book that took Juliet completely by surprise. In just under 3 weeks, she has sold hundreds of copies throughout Canada by word of mouth and on her web site, and the books are now in their third print run.

Juliet is donating 10% of all profits from the book to the charity Feed The Children. The Best of British Cookery Book sells for \$21.99 including tax, postage and packing.

World-class judge to officiate at major dog trial Meirion Owen to judge sheepdog trials in Milton

enowned sheepdog handling judge Meirion Owen will travel half way across the world from Wales to judge the fifth annual sheepdog trials at Country Heritage Park. This year's sheepdog trials will be held this Saturday June 25th and Sunday June 26th from 9:00am to 5:00pm daily. Ninety of North America's top dogs and their handlers will compete in an exciting competition of sheep herding. There will also be a Frisbee challenge on Saturday and canine sports demonstrations on Sunday.

Meirion Owen, has been competing in sheep dogs trials since he was nine. He appears

regularly on television and radio and has been the Welsh National Champion. "Meirion has been recommended to me by other judges we've have in the past, and we've been trying to get him for a few years now," comments Vikki Kidd, the organizer of the event. "Country Heritage Park has a tradition of importing judges from the UK, and we are actually one of the few trials in Ontario that does this. Expert judging is very valuable in assisting handlers and their dogs to develop skills and reach their potential. Expert judging brings the best out of top dogs and makes this trial at Country Heritage Park an exceptional competition."

Rounding out the weekend are sheep shearing, spinning, and wool dying demonstrations. In addition guests can visit many of the park's 30 exhibits including 1830's and 1870's homes, a 1910 school and see farm animals. Spectator dogs are always welcome.

Country Heritage Park is nestled in the shadow of the Niagara Escarpment south of Highway 410, on Tremaine Road west of Milton, Ontario. It offers educational programs for school children, special events, attractions, tour group programs, day camps, historical interpretation of exhibits, and an outstanding collection of antique tractors, steam engines, farm equipment and rural life artifacts. 
