
The 25th Strawberry Fair



Local yard sale is part of a summertime tradition for Halton residents

Doreen McCall of Campbellville spent the better part of a day looking for bargains at the Opsteens' charity yard sale off Campbellville Sideroad last weekend. When she was finished McCall had filled her truck with antiques, and an eclectic mix of other items as well as books for her school's library at Hitherfield Preparatory School.

The Opsteens' yard sale is one that she can't pass up, and she's not alone in her interest in finding bargains right in her own neighbourhood. According to the Canada Safety Council, for many Canadians yard sales and garage sales are an annual ritual.

Like a lot of Halton residents who get bitten by the yard sale bug during the warmer months, McCall comes back year after year to check out items available at the Opsteens'. McCall admits part of the attraction is the community aspect: she meets people she hasn't seen since the last sale and she's happy that all the money raised is used to benefit a local charity.

Christina Opsteen, who began the sale along with her husband Cory and neighbour Pearl Eirich back in 1995, says the original idea, then as now, was to raise money for Independent Living Halton, a non-profit

charitable organization that assists adults who are facing severe physical challenges. Since 1995, the annual sales have generated approximately \$20,000 for Independent Living Halton, with all proceeds going to the local charity.

Initially the sale was held only once a year. But it proved to be so popular that the Opsteens began holding the event two times a year. Each June and September, the couples' yard is full of new donated items as well as reused items such as bicycles, books, china, paintings, baskets, toys, computer equipment, and coffee makers.

The Opsteens spend a lot of time preparing for each sale, but they say they are heartened by all the support they receive from the community. Volunteers help out at the yard sales each year and many people have donated items that the couple stores in a shed on their property. "The same people support us year after year with donations," says Christina proudly.

And each year, there are always plenty of people out there looking for bargains available at a yard sale. "Some people stay for an hour," notes Christina. "And some people stay the whole day."
