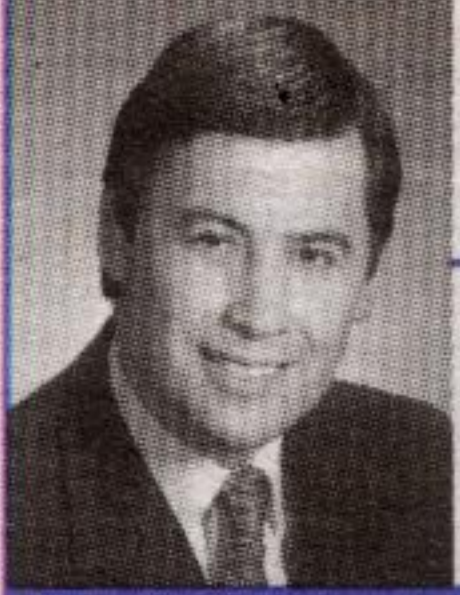


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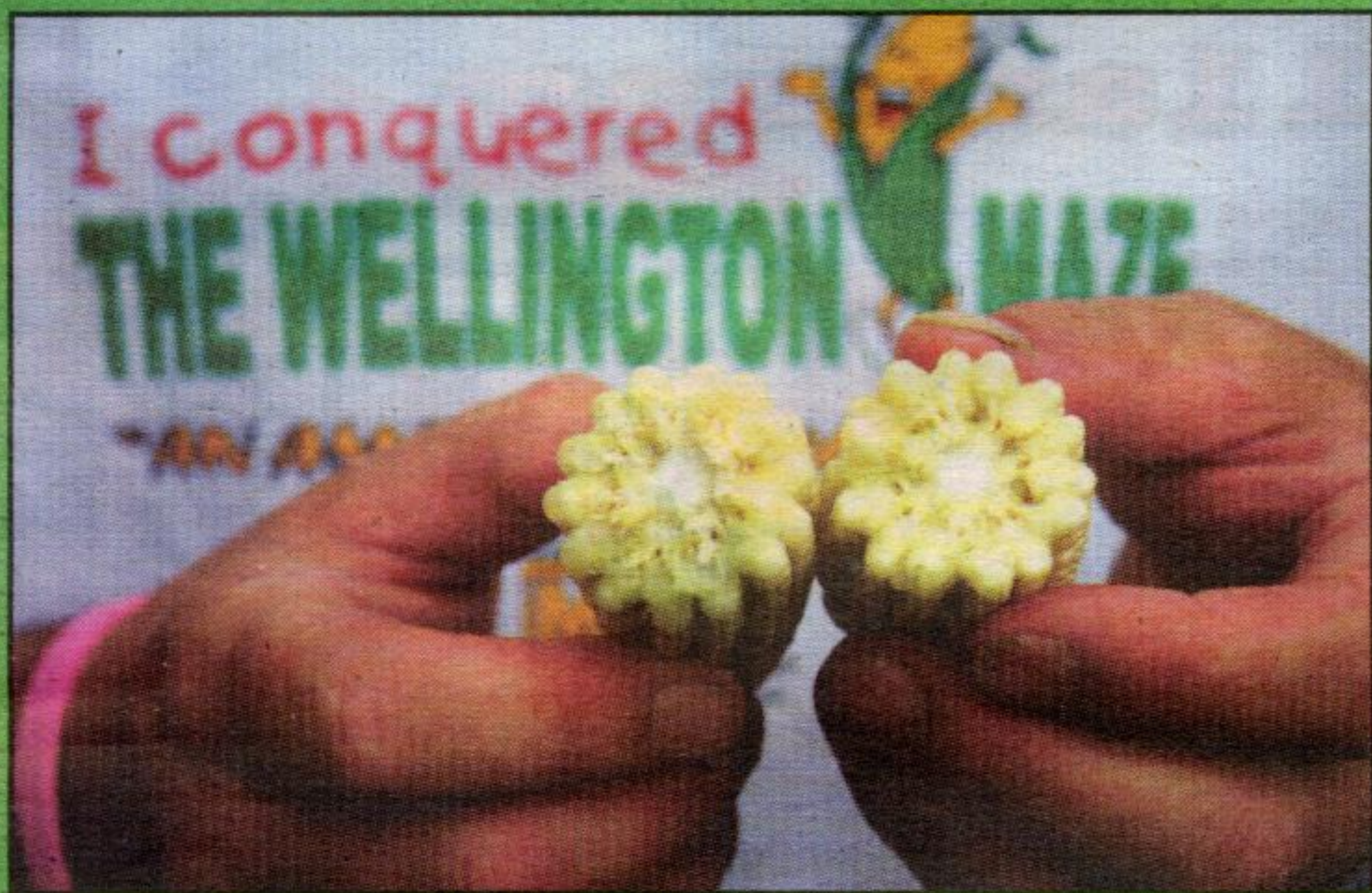

More WNV activity found in Burlington

The Halton Region Health Department received confirmation on Tuesday of further West Nile virus (WNV) activity in south Burlington. Two dead crows reported to the Halton Region Health Department on July 27 and 28 tested positive for the virus, as did a pool of mosquitoes that were trapped on July 28. The crows were found in the areas of Walkers Line and Fairview Street, and Guelph Line and Fairview Street. The mosquitoes were trapped in the area of Walkers Line and Spruce Avenue.

"These results reaffirm the presence of West Nile virus activity in Halton, especially in south Burlington," said Dr. Bob Nosal, Medical Officer of Health for Halton Region. "Clearly this is the

time when people need to practice personal protection against mosquito bites. August and September are the months of highest risk for West Nile virus illness in humans."

There have been no human cases of WNV in Halton yet this season. Maps showing the locations of WNV activity, as well as any areas where standing water sites or catch basins have been larvicided, are available on the Health Department's website at www.region.halton.on.ca/health.
