ow, now that's spin. Gary leaves us with the impression that Brian Mulroney's Conservatives were responsible for putting the country into massive debt which Paul Martin then single-handedly saved us from. What he doesn't mention is that it was the irresponsible management of the previous Liberal governments that put us in that position.
