
and much more.

**European Gigolo** 



## Seduction

## Too Close to the Falls: a memoir

Catherine Gildiner, ECW Press, 1999, 350 pages, softcover

Seduction - sounds like a steamy romance novel but in this case it is a fastpaced murder mystery set in Vienna, London and Toronto.

The two unlikely investigators include Kate, currently in prison for murdering her husband, and Jackie, a former bank robber who is now a private detective. While in prison Kate studied and studied, winding up with her Ph.D. and recognized as a world expert on Freud. Her psychiatrist offers her a temporary leave from prison if she and Jackie will go to Vienna and find out who is threatening the current director of the Freud Academy and what revelations his research projects may bring about. As the two travel from city to city Kate explains Freud's theories, in lay terms, to Jackie.

The pace is fast, the scenes interesting, the characters well-drawn if slightly implausible and along the way one painlessly learns about Freud including his seduction theory.

The author, Catherine Gildiner, has a background which includes a twenty-five year practice as a clinical psychologist in Toronto. In addition to Seduction she is the author of a bestselling memoir of her childhood in Lewisport, New York, near Niagara Falls. The memoir Too Close To The Falls is outstanding and was a hit from the moment it hit the shelves in bookstores.

Catherine was a hyperactive child so her family doctor suggested to her parents that she should have a job. Soon she was working sixty hours a week as the driver's assistant for the delivery service provided by McClure's drugstore. The driver, a black man named Roy, could not read (this was 1950's USA) so Catherine, age four, read the maps, planned the route, sorted the delivery items and read medication instructions to the customers. Deliveries were made to average families, to Marilyn Monroe on the set of "Niagara", to elderly and destitute prostitutes, to the Dupont family, to Dr. Jonas Salk (polio vaccine) and to the Tuscarora Indian reservation.

Along with prescription deliveries the memoir talks about Gildiner's mother who never in her entire life made a meal, outlines how Gildiner tamed the school bully, and explains Gildiner and her mother running a police blockade in order to get a story for the school newspaper about the expropriation of the Tuscarora people from their land.

The memoir is often hilarious, sometimes poignant and fascinating cover to

Gildiner now leads a "normal" life in Toronto but her memoir of her very unusual childhood may go some way to explaining how and why she would write a murder mystery about Freudian theories.
