building itself was in rough shape.

Residents however, noted that for those who have lived in the community all their lives, it would be difficult to see the houses moved or torn down and the streetscape changed so dramatically.

Some participants wondered why town staff needed to be located under the same roof.

Brian Penman, Milton councillor, Ward 1, pointed out that the town already has land at the current town hall location and that it would need to be purchased if the expansion was to take place elsewhere.

Other observations on the issue pointed out that during previous planning decisions, the public had indicated a wish to keep a civic presence in the downtown core. "You take the heart out of this build-

ing and you'll lose something," remarked Mark Curtis, Milton councillor, Ward 2.

When it came to parking spaces, which may be underground ones, many of those in attendance felt that the planned number of 150 spots was inadequate given the increased population numbers expected that may result in more staff.

"It's difficult to determine the appropriate amount of parking," said Penman.

There will be another open house on October 5 that will provide further opportunity for comment on a proposed design and a budget for the project that is slated to begin late in the spring of 2006.


