

The Holland Shop celebrates 50 years

This September marks 50 years at the Holland Shop

Help us celebrate at our Open House September 22, 23, and 24

Plans are in full swing to mark the occasion. What's unique about this on-of-a-kind store in Acton, is that it is "third generation". The current owner, Carolin Tolkamp, is the granddaughter of the person who started it all, Engel Huisman.

Let's go on a trip "down memory lane" with Carolin.

Spring 1951: Engel and Mary Huisman arrive in Canada by boat from Holland, and settle at first in Orangeville. In those early days, Engel worked as a "pin boy" at the local bowling alley. He then went on to factory work. In his heart, however, was a dream. He wanted to start up a store somehow. He met a lot of Dutch immigrants, longing for their homeland, and he knew they would buy the things they couldn't find here.

From humble beginnings, he started first by selling peppermints and licorice at the weekly catechism

By November of that first year, he received his first shipment by train with more items shipped from Holland. Soon, he borrowed a bike with saddlebags, on which he would ride all over the countryside in the evenings and Saturdays. In time, he purchased a small truck from which to sell his wares. One his of favourite methods of selling the much sought after baby clothes and Dutch cloth diapers was to tuck them in with


every day items like dishbrushes and washing soap. This was done because you just didn't' talk about a woman's pregnancy.

In due time, the Huisman family moved to Acton, and Engel rented shop space in town. He kept the delivery route up for a time to deliver product to the countryside. The store as it is known now as the Holland Shop is actually the second location. (Engel)Bert was the shop

1955 to 1983. His daughters, Agnes and Theresa, helped until they got married. After, his wife helped him. Some time later, Nell Feenstra came to work for him. Her daughter-in-law, Joanne Feenstra started working while Bert ran the store, and she is still working to this day! When Bert became sick in 1983, his daughter Theresa, and her husband Ralph Fledderus, took over the store. They ran the store

which time their daughter Carolin took over. Carolin has been the owner for 15 years. Her mother, Theresa, continued to help her out at the store for some years, until her death in 2002.

Carolin is proud to provide the kind of service her customers have come to expect. She and her employees make up a smiling team that is always ready to share the latest bit of news, give encouragement, or just make a delicious sandwich. The Holland Shop is a truly unique phe-
