inclusive and healthy community.

Kathleen Szoke, chair of Affordable Housing Halton spoke out for the need of new volunteers. "We hope to grow the organization because we are passionate about our message and we do not have enough people to do what we want to do," Kathleen Szoke said. "We hope that people will get on board and help us with our message because the big thing that we do is awareness."

In Halton, some residents are at risk of becoming homeless, as they cannot afford to pay their rent due to shifting demographics, old age, and personal events. Often, the individuals who are affected by high rent costs are forced to leave their communities away from family and friends to find affordable housing. Low-income families, single parents, and individuals often find themselves in situations where they must chose between paying the rent, buying food or other requirements for their survival. Affordable Housing Halton believes that residents who live in safe, stable, affordable housing cost their community less in health, social service, education, policing and justice costs.

Bat Tests Positive for Rabies in Oakville

est results confirm that a bat found at an Oakville residence had rabies. This is Halton's first rabid bat in 2005. Following an investigation by the Halton Region Health Department, two adults and one child are now receiving rabies vaccine as a precaution after being exposed to the bat.

The Health Department is advising all Halton residents to avoid contact with bats and to be very cautious if around them. Anyone who suspects they have come into contact with a bat should promptly report the incident to the Health

Bat rabies is fatal if a person is infected and not treated before symptoms start. Symptoms can take up to one year to appear. Bats can be found in barns, caves, and occasionally in homes. Infected animals carry the virus in their saliva and pass it to other animals or people through bites and contaminated wounds. Each incident of possible exposure should be reported to the Health Department for investigation, even if you were not bitten.

The rabies virus can infect any mammal. Those most commonly infected are bats, skunks, foxes, and raccoons. There are a number of things you can do to help identify a rabid animal, help prevent the spread of rabies and protect yourself.

- Warn your children to stay away from wild, stray, or aggressive animals to protect themselves
- Do not touch dead or sick animals, unless advised to do so
- Do not feed or touch wild animals
- Do not touch bats, skunks, raccoons or foxes or try to keep them as pets
- Make sure your pet is vaccinated against rabies
- Keep your pet tied on a leash
- Learn to identify the signs of rabies in animals. For details visit www.region.halton.on.ca/health
- Report all animal bites or potential bites to the Health Department
- Seek immediate medical attention if you come in contact with a bat or other potentially rabid animals
- Contact your local animal control department if you see a potentially rabid animal
- Animal-proof your house, cottage, and workplace. Ensure that any holes in your walls or roof are blocked off.
