

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Tindshields do more than keep out the rain. They are structurally part of the car, stiffening the roof and front cowl area. The windshield is also an important part of the SRS system (air bags). Still driving with a cracked glass?... It's just not safe.

Good Morning Dave

I own a 2003 Saturn Vue. I had the front brakes replaced and I hear a noise when I apply the brakes in the morning. This has happened since the last brake job. The repair company says its just humidity/moisture and not to worry about it. My question is how come it does it now but never did it when I had the original new brakes? Thanks for your help.

The shop is absolutely correct...We call this problem "morning sickness". The parts actually develop a coating of rust over night. The first application of the brakes scrapes off this layer causing noise. As brakes wear a small layer of friction material imbeds itself in the surface of the brake rotor. This material can act as "paint" and prevents the rust from forming: In short the grinding noise should stop as the brakes are bedded in. By the way avoid hard application of the brakes during break-in (200 kms). Being harsh during this period can lead to squealing when the brakes are applied.

Hi Dave

I drive a 2004 Honda Accord. My transmission has D4 and D3 on the shifter consul. I'm not quite sure which one I should select. Help!

Stan

The most common automatic transmission in use today is a 4-speed unit. By selecting D4 you will have access to all four gears available. The fourth gear in most vehicles is an overdrive. The gearing is referred to as tall. It allows the engine to turn slower on the hwy. The car runs quiet and easy, giving better mileage. When you select D3 you lock out the fourth gear. This setting will spin the engine faster...more power, engine braking and more noise. I use D3 around town and D4 on the open road. Manufacturers are currently developing 8 speed units to try and improve fuel economy. I wonder how many, D's we'll have to choose from when these units are in service?
