

It's Spider-Man 2.5... Kind Of.

Title: Ultimate Spider-Man

Age Appropriateness: Comic book violence. Very difficult at times. Recommended 14+ Ultimate Spider-Man is the spiritual sequel to last summer's excellent Spider-Man 2 movie game. It has nothing to do with the movie game plot-wise, but you can tell that the developers used SM2's go-anywhere game structure as their starting point when designing Ultimate. Ultimate takes two large jumps from that origin that make it dramatically different: first off, the game is done in the best cell-shaded style I've ever seen on a console, with the game's models and camera cuts combining to make visuals that look exactly like Mark Bagley's pencils from the Ultimate Spider-Man comic (Bagley and series writer Brian Michael Bendis consulted and co-wrote the game).

The second major diversion is a reworking of the game's combat system and mission structure. SM2 featured dozens of unlockable combo moves that were lots of fun to use and added some visual flair to the game, but were largely unnecessary to win fights. Missions consisted mostly of Spidey pummelling waves of lowly goons using the same half-dozen or so basic moves. Ultimate has a much simpler combat system, with no real combos or trick moves to speak of. The game's missions were changed to match the new combat system; since combat isn't about tricky methods of pummelling swarms of guys, with a bigger focus on single-enemy combat and jumping, the game's missions are almost exclusively a string of entertaining boss fights. Spidey takes on a half-dozen major enemies over the course of the rather short campaign, with each villain requiring different tactics and careful planning. This helps to keep the game interesting, as there's a definite difference between the missions and the random crime stopping you have to do between them.

There are two main problems I encountered in Ultimate Spider-Man. First off: it's REALLY hard. I averaged somewhere around ten attempts before beating each of the game's boss fights, as even when you figure out the right timing and patterns for the villain you're facing, executing your plans requires insanely careful movement and camera manipulation to accomplish. And speaking of cameras, whoever programmed Ultimate Spider-Man's camera, should be fired. It never follows combat, it can't track the fast-moving villains, and it's incredibly stuttery and stilted during webswinging. I can't count the number of times I died and reloaded a major fight or race because the camera killed me.

Despite that glaring problem, Ultimate Spider-Man is still a beautiful, fun game. If you liked the second movie game or you're a fan of the comic, it's a definite pick-up. Just keep a bottle of aspirin handy.

A History of Violence

Congratulations to Canadian director David Cronenberg for creating yet another film that tackles important social and political issues. A History of Violence is loosely based on the graphic novel by John Wagner and Vince Locke that tells the tale of an ordinary man in extraordinary circumstances. Tom Stall is an easygoing family man who runs a diner in Indiana. When two dangerous criminals come into the restaurant ready to cause a disturbance, Tom ends up shooting them both and becomes a local hero.

Like any small town, the news spreads fast and soon the Philly mobster Carl Fogaty shows up claiming that Tom is actually a former hit man Eddie Cusack. Turns out that Eddie and Carl have some unfinished business to take care of, but Tom cannot convince Eddie of his mistaken identity. As the small town Dad tries to forget his fame, Eddie persists and ends up dragging Tom's



children into danger.

While his past films, such as The Dead Zone, The Fly, Dead Ringers, M. Butterfly and Spider, all have a futuristic and fantastic quality to them, Cronenberg's A History of Violence creates a realistic modern world where morals are frequently questioned and evil lurks everywhere. With an MPAA rating of R for strong brutal violence, graphic sexuality, nudity, language and some drug use, this film is definitely recommended for adults only. It has a run time of ninety-six minutes, however the film seems rather short because of it's fast paced storyline.
