
Demonstration Program

Painting with Alzheimer's

ccomplished Oakville artist Gail Mowat is teaching Alzheimer's patients at the Adult Day Program watercolour painting. The program is part of the services for seniors at Allendale. Gail shows up with her brushes and paints hoping that with a little encouragement, her six-week course in art will inspire. For her art is the best medicine. "Artists put a lot of soul into a painting," Gail explains. "The course may bring out the artist within them and help them communicate."

Alzheimer's is a familiar type of dementia, a condition that gradually destroys the brain cells and leads to a progressive decline in mental function. It affects the patient's ability to learn, reason, communicate, make judgments and carry out regular daily activities. As Alzheimer's develops, individuals may experience a change in their personalities and behaviour. Currently there is no cure for Alzheimer's.

Gail has her own story when it comes to Alzheimer's disease. Her stepfather suffers from the illness. For Gail's mother, the days can be long and frustrating coping with the effects of the disease. As fate would have it, a breakthrough in her stepfathers' condition took place once he discovered watercolour painting. "He and my mom are in a private care facility in Montreal and a local artist there started a painting program," Gail said. "My stepfather went to a few classes and discovered his talent for painting. He now sells his work, and is very proud of this." -

Gail says that she was born with a paintbrush in her hand. Originally from Montreal, Gail has been an adult teacher in Halton for over 10 years. She attended various schools including the Haliburton School of Fine Art. She teaches all art forms and currently sits on the Oakville Arts Council.
