husband stopped by this wonderful restaurant and saw bare walls. He asked Hedi if she would like some artwork and in a week, all of them were gone. I have a warm relationship with everyone who works here and it feels like home to me because it is home."

Trisha says one of the best parts of going on tour is meeting old friends and new faces. "Today I met some amazing new people I have never met before which was interesting for me," Trisha commented. "It tells me that there are a bunch of new collectors out there which is so wonderful for me as an artist to discover. It is truly amazing that people are looking forward to new pieces. That I can create things from my heart and that so many people appreciate them."

Today, Trisha lives in Niagara on the Lake with her husband and family, but she never forgets the warmth and wonder of the community where her early beginnings took place. "When I first moved to Halton, I was a young mother and we had so many great memories of this area, never to be forgotten," Trisha reflected. "I
