I do know that the last Canadian to do it in the Olympics was Paul Knox of the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen in a 23-0 waltz over Austria at Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy in 1956. Knox, a graduate of the old St. Michael's College Majors Junior A club, later taught high school in Fergus in between driving Acton Tanner goalies Jackie Marshall, Norm Lockhurst and Jim Sweeney crazy as a winger with the Fergus Flyers intermediate club in the 1960s.

On of the saddest messages of my boyhood was hearing that the Dutchmen had not only lost to the Soviets but also the United States and wound up with only a bronze medal. The Kitchener bus passed through Acton on the way back from the airport and my classmates and I at Robert Little School had been told it might stop. But under the circumstances both the Dutchmen and we were content to have the wheels keep rolling north on Main Street

Forty-two years later Canada is still trying to win a gold medal in hockey, the same one earned by the Edmonton Mercurys four years before Paul Knox played his first Olympic game and the same year I was drawing picture of hockey sweaters in my Grade 3 notebook.

Town looks at mandatory detectors

The pros and cons of making carbon monoxide detectors mandatory in existing housing units is being discussed by Halton Hills Fire Department staff.

Recently Toronto council called for mandatory detectors in homes heated by burning fuels like oil, gas or wood. Homes heated by electricity would be exempt.

Halton Hills Fire Chief Bill Cunningham said they have a real concern about the number of false alarms they are now responding to from people with the detectors.

"If they (carbon monoxide detectors) become mandatory, obviously there would be even more false alarms," Chief Cunningham explained in an interview on Monday. "We've been having so many of them (false alarms) that we've started to track them to see what the causes have been."

Once the Toronto bylaw takes effect building inspectors will be able to force homeowners to install detectors before they can get building permits for major renovations.
